GCSD Mission

GCSD Budget Development – WHY?

- Required by California Laws and Accounting Standards
- Provides a Measure of Fiscal Accountability
- Measures Success and Achievement of Board Goals
- Identifies Cashflow for Priority Setting
- Transparency regarding how rate and tax dollars are spent

GCSD Budget Development – HOW?

- Costs Estimated Based on Improvement Needs Identified in Service Master Plans, Engineering Studies, Maintenance Records and Replacement Strategies
- Review by and Input from GCSD Operations, Maintenance, Customer Service, Engineering and Construction Professionals
- Lead, Developed and Managed by GCSD Accounting and Management Team
- Amounts Based on Past and Projected Future Expense Trends, Number of Customers/Growth, Estimated Cost of Materials, Fuel, Supplies and Construction

How are GCSD Services Funded?

- Sewer service monthly utility rates, charges and fees
- Water monthly utility rates, charges and fees
- Park Property tax, cell tower leases, facility rental
- Fire Property tax, state reimbursement for engine rental

- State constitution and laws prohibit comingling of funds among services
- > Grants available for some projects and equipment purchases

- WWTP Blower and Generator Room Rehabilitation
- Clearwell Rehabilitation and Butler Wy Booster Project
- Ballfield Waterline Replacement
- New Trible GPS Equipment
- Purchased 37 acres of land to provide access to Deer Flat Road and improve parks
- Repaired and replaced lift station pumps
- WWTP and Corp Yard Road Renovations
- Planning and design for dozens of projects

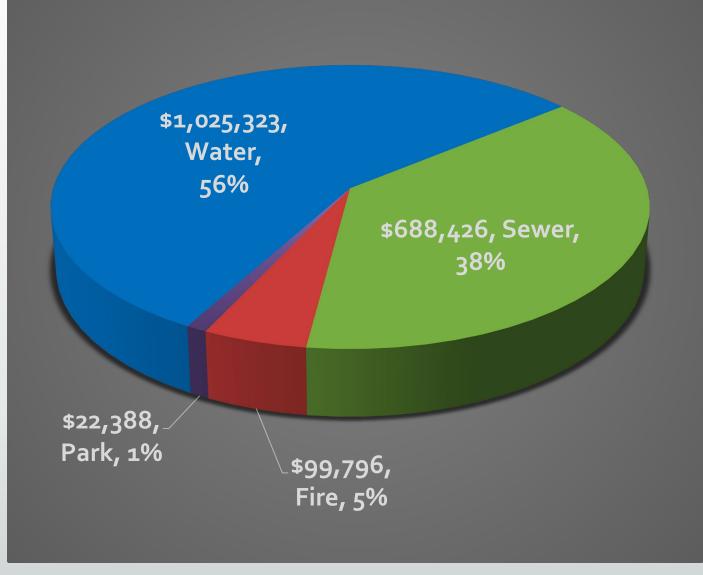
2021/22 PROJECTED FYE REVENUE TO EXPENSE

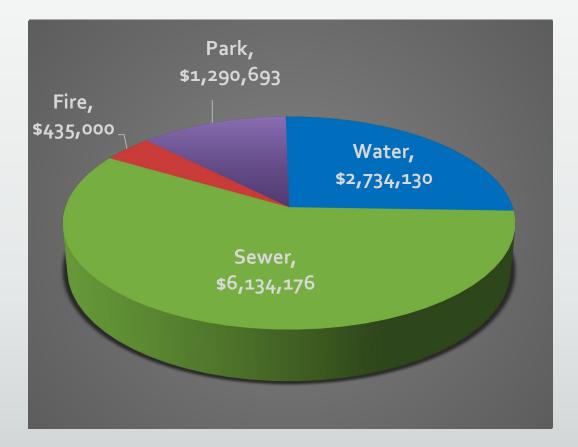

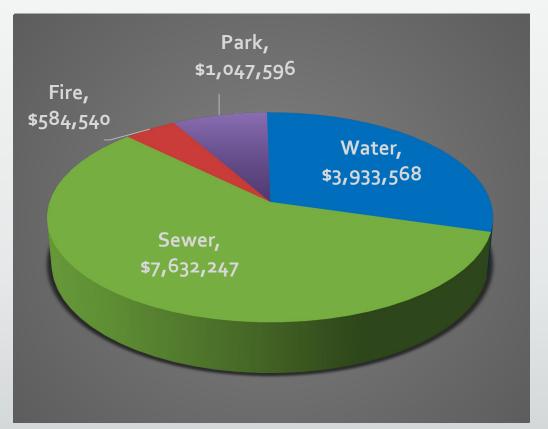

Improving and Replacing Existing Infrastructure to Stabilize and Reduce Long Term Costs

- WWTP Improvements
- Sewer Collection System Rehabilitation (\$5.8 Million grant/loan)
- Lift Station #2 Renovation
- Emergency Power Generator Replacements
- SCADA Improvements
- Tank 5 Improvements Planned as Amendment to Clearwell Rehabilitation Project
- Pump, Controls and Valve Replacements (Water and Sewer)
- Park Restroom Replacement
- Asphalt Replacement and Rehabilitation

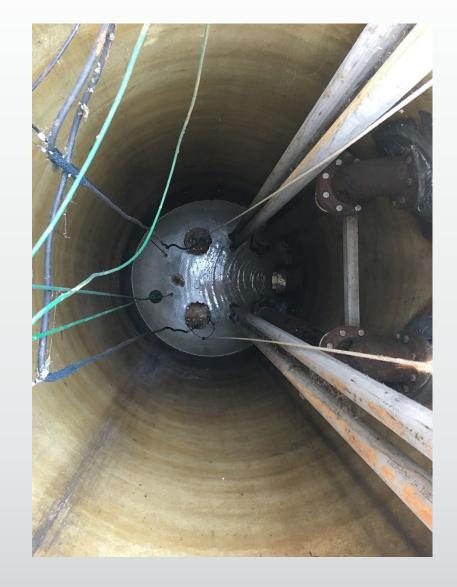
Projects, Continued

Improving and Replacing Existing Infrastructure to Stabilize and Reduce Long Term Costs

- Unmanned Aerial Vehicle for CERT, Fire Department and Utility Inspection
- Fuel Tank Upgrade and Automation Project
- Groveland Drought Resilience Project; Complete Planning, Design and Permitting (\$8.5 million grant)
- Replacement water plan lab equipment and chemical feed systems
- Lift station asphalt rehabilitation
- Lift station pump replacements

Capital Equipment

Investing in Technology and Equipment Replacement Strategies that Reduce Costs Long Term

- Replacement Dump Truck (Replaces 1986 truck; carried over from last FY with a \$33,000 increase)
- Replace two 15 year old trucks (approved in 2021 FY budget/carried forward due to supply chain issues/increased cost)
- Replace 17 year old truck
- Purchase two new trucks (supports two added staff in Operations Supervisor and IT)
- Purchase New Vac-Con Truck
 - Carried forward from last FY due to supply chain
- Upgrade GIS capabilities for documenting and mapping utilities
