BACKGROUND:

District staff has been aggressively seeking grant funding opportunities for planned improvements at the park and other district properties. The board authorized several recent grant applications, which required us to break out various components up the overall improvements plan in two separate projects that best met the respective grant criteria. The purpose of this discussion is to continue to receive board and public input on the various components of the park project and their final design, as well as to discuss in more detail the scope and cost estimates for each of the grants submitted.


Also staff would like to cover with the committee the planned remaining components of the project and the funding opportunities upcoming and in the future for these project pieces.








GROVELAND GATEWAY: THE BIG PICTURE









GROVELAND GATEWAY: LOWER PARK AND AMPHITHEATER






The Blue Zones Project Tuolumne County is excited to submit this letter of support to the Groveland Community Services District (GCSD) for the project application for a Clean California Grant.

The Blue Zones project is a community-wide well-being improvement initiative designed to help make healthy choices easier for everyone in our community. We partner with agencies such as GCSD who support changes and create opportunities that lead to those healthier options. A key focus area is to ensure safe accessibility within the built environment. It is critical that parks, trails, paths, and all recreation opportunities and recreation facilities are safe and available to all.

The GCSD Clean and Healthy Community project addresses the safety and accessibility of healthy infrastructure in the built environment of Groveland. Dear Clean California Grant Funding Program,

County of Tuolumne Department of Public Works writes on behalf of the Groveland Community Services District (GCSD) in support of their Clean Community, Healthy Community Project application for the Clean California Local Grant Program that is targeted to address many of the deficiencies and needs surrounding the clean-up and beautification throughout the Groveland community.

The community of Groveland is heavily inundated year-round with visitors on their way to Yosemite National Park as it is located along Highway 120, and visitors that enter through the Big Oak Flat entrance must travel through the town of Groveland. The National Park Service data shows that over 920,000 visitors that visited Yosemite National Park entered via the Big Oak Flat entrance in 2021.

Currently, Groveland does not have the infrastructure in place to adequately meet the sanitary demands this visitor load brings to the community and is in need of enhanced beautification support components to create an aesthetically pleasing, functional and welcoming environment that supports healthy outdoor recreation and enjoyment of the community. Groveland's Mary Laveroni Park is the only public park with restroom facility between Oakdale and the entrance of Yosemite National Park, a distance of over 90 miles. The one and only existing public restroom is not ADA compliant, extremely undersized, and inadequate to meet the level of demand it experiences via tour buses and travelers who use the park as a rest/bus stop, often rendering the restrooms unsanitary and unusable, although cleaned and restocked on a regular basis.

There are not enough trash receptacles located in Mary Laveroni Park or throughout downtown Groveland, and both are completely absent of recycling receptacles. This results in multiple overflowing trash bins on a regular basis creating a nuisance impacting the park and those utilizing it for healthy outdoor activities, for rest, relaxation, and recreational purposes.

The District recently purchased a 37-acre property for the purpose of expanding and enhancing local recreational opportunities to promote an active and healthy community. This property currently contains a significant amount of trash as a result of being used as an illegal dumping ground for various forms of household garage and contactor waste, rendering the property unsafe and unusable at this time for its intended purpose.

This Clean California grant funding would give the District the opportunity to provide updated and

expanded public restroom facilities, needed infrastructure and facilities including covered tables, improved Yosemite Area Regional Transit (YARTS) bus stop, benches, trash and recycling containers, drought tolerant landscaping resulting in a more desirable and healthier asset that will enhance the lives and experiences of residents and visitors alike. The GCSD Clean and Healthy Community project also provides the opening of 37 acres to public use with walking, biking, and hiking trails, scenic vistas of the Tuolumne River canyon and premier birdwatching opportunities. This new public area is ideally located adjacent to the existing park in downtown Groveland and will promote opportunities for healthy recreation and longer tourist stays in the community.

The project provides support facilities for the YARTS in the park and linkage between the park, community, and downtown areas.

Clean communities are healthy communities and County of Tuolumne Department of Public Works supports the Groveland Community Services District's Clean Community, Healthy Community Project targeted to improve the health, safety, and mobility of the community of Groveland.




Figure 9: Miscellaneous trash is frequently left throughout downtown Groveland. New receptacles will help to alleviate this issue by providing a proper waste outlet.




Figure 11: Past community engagement event focused on potential park improvements.




Figure 17: Rendition example used in early public engagement events.


